Identity Development

Residents will live in an environment that is structured to encourage personal reflection and value exploration, while living in a diverse community.

Residents will...

- 2. Identify and model values, beliefs, personal ethics and leadership style.
- 3. Learn to practice stress management and healthy living.
- 4. Learn to identify, implement, and take ownership of how decision making can impact personal and community well-being.
- 5. Be encouraged to explore local and global civic engagement.

Academic Success

Residents will live in a community full of resources designed to promote intellectual growth and academic success.

Residents will...

- 1. Set annual goals, develop a plan to achieve those goals, and identify obstacles and resources.
- 2. Identify and make use of resources and skills (e.g. offices, tutoring, study groups) and skills that promote academic success.
- 3. Initiate and reflect on intellectual conversations about academic material in out of classroom environments.
- 4. Learn to develop and modify personal routines in order to prioritize and manage competing academic and personal demands.
- 5. Use critical thinking in problem-solving and decision-making process.

Community Engagement

Residents will live in an environment that enables them to engage in and interact with a diverse and inclusive community in order to foster the cooperation and mutual understanding necessary for successful group living.

Residents will...

- 1. Build and sustain relationships with individuals in their community.
- 2. Learn roles, responsibilities, and behavioral expectations within a community.
- 3. Take on leadership roles and positively contribute in one's community, Residential Education & Housing community, community service or in extra-curricular organizations.
- 4. Gain experience dealing with conflict and navigating toward a resolution.
- 5. Engage in respectful civil discourse with others in a community of different identities and points of view.
